



Treatment Court Sessions

The Treatment Court Judge will be given a progress report at each Court session that has been prepared by the Treatment Team. The report will include information about your drug test results, attendance at counseling and meetings, attitude and participation in the program, and employment/education status. The Judge may ask you questions about your progress and discuss any specific problems you have been experiencing.

If you are doing well, you will be encouraged to continue with your program and work toward continued success. If you are not doing well, the Judge will discuss this with you and determine further action/changes. The goal of the court is to help you achieve abstinence from drugs and alcohol.

Failure to appear in court on the date and time you are scheduled could result in additional sanctions being imposed. If you cannot appear as scheduled due to an urgent situation, you must notify the Coordinator BEFORE your scheduled time to be excused. Leaving a message does not fulfill this obligation.

What is Treatment Court?

Treatment Court is a structured program that serves high-risk, high-need drug offenders. Ongoing treatment, intense court and probation supervision, and community support services are part of the program.

How Do I Qualify to Participate?

- 18 years of age or older
- Jackson County resident
- Charged with a felony related to drug abuse or dependence, or violates felony probation due to substance abusing patterns
- Willing to address substance abuse/dependence

What does the Path to Success Look Like?

You have the opportunity to:

- Increase your chances of living a healthy, crime free and sober life
- Heal relationships with your family
- Spend less time in jail
- Receive ongoing, individual support
- Experience freedom from drug dependence

How Long Does it Take?

The length of the program is determined by each participant's progress through the four phases. Graduation may occur within one year, but it is likely to take additional time beyond that depending on the participant's treatment needs, accountability and meeting all minimum phase requirements.

How Does the Program Work?

- Referral: The offender and counsel must submit a signed application to the Treatment Court Coordinator.
- Assessment: Potential participants must meet with Stein Counseling. Needs will be assessed and a treatment plan will be developed.
- Admission: The candidate is assessed, voted upon, and deemed appropriate for admission by the Treatment Court Team.
- Court Appearances: The Judge will actively monitor your case through regular court appearances.
- Treatment and support: Ongoing, individualized treatment is required in addition to self-help group attendance.
- Participants will be frequently tested for drug and alcohol use throughout the program.
- Incentives & Sanctions: Rewards are given for positive behavior and sanctions are imposed for inappropriate behavior.
- Treatment Court works concurrently with DOC probation and participants are required to report to their probation officer as instructed and are subject to the terms and conditions of probation during the entire course of treatment.

We are committed to your success and will work closely with you to help you change your lifestyle, thinking and behavior. As your quality of life improves, you will see the benefits of working an honest life of recovery. We will celebrate all of your successes in life and we will support you when things are difficult.

Overview of Treatment Phases

Phase I Stabilization (Min. 8 weeks)

Assessment

12-step support group attendance encouraged

Begin individual sessions with provider

Bi-weekly court appearances

Frequent and random drug/alcohol screens

Goal: Discontinue drug use and stabilize health

Phase II Early Recovery (Min. 16 weeks)

12-step support group attendance encouraged

Bi-weekly court appearances

Attend group counseling

Family Education – 1x/week, 12 weeks

Individual sessions with provider

Continued random and frequent drug/alcohol screenings

Goal: Remain drug free, seek and maintain employment and understand the need to follow programming.

Phase III Recovery Living (Min. 13 weeks)

12-step support group attendance encouraged

Bi-Weekly court appearances

Individual sessions with provider

Possible continuation of group counseling

Continued random and frequent drug/alcohol screenings

Goal: Maintain sobriety and begin to look at future aftercare needs.

Phase IV: Aftercare (Min. 17 weeks)

Establish and define a pattern of 12-step meetings

Individual sessions move to maintenance at every other week or monthly

Random drug screens conducted

Goal: Adapt and support an independent lifestyle by applying learned skills.
