

**REGULAR SESSION

JACKSON COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS**

March 21, 2022

The Regular Session of the Jackson County Board of Supervisors was called to order at 5:30 P.M., on Monday, March 21, 2022, at the Health and Human Services Building in the Black River Room by Chairman Ransom.

County Clerk, Cindy Altman, took roll call with 17 members present and 2 members excused (Supervisor Carney) and (Supervisor Gearing Lancaster).

The Pledge of Allegiance was given.

Chairman Ransom asked if there were any corrections or additions to the minutes of the previous meeting. Supervisor Chamberlain made a motion to approve the minutes. This was seconded by Supervisor Staff. Voice vote was taken with 17 present voting Aye.

Chairman Ransom stated that we have a State of Emergency Declaration still in place at this time. Supervisor Higgins made a motion to repeal the State of Emergency Declaration currently in place effective April 1, 2022. This was seconded by Supervisor Chamberlain. Voice vote was taken with 17 present voting Aye.

Chairman Ransom opened the public hearing for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG–CLOSE) for the Reconstruction of County Road K at 5:33 p.m. No public comments were made. Discussion took place. Chairman Ransom closed the public hearing at 5:36 p.m.

At this time Chairman Ransom, and County Clerk, Cindy Altman recognized employees who have given 5, 10, and 15 years of service to the County by presenting them with certificates. Those who have 20, 25, and 35 years were awarded plaques recognizing their service.

Chairman Ransom introduced the new Emergency Management Coordinator Jack Workman.

RESOLUTION # 13-03-2022

TO: The Honorable Members of the Jackson County Board of Supervisors

RE: Establishing Total Annual Compensation for Sheriff and Clerk of Court Pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.22

WHEREAS, Pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.22 (1), the Board must establish the total annual compensation for services to be paid to the Sheriff and Clerk of Court prior to the earliest time for filing nomination papers for the county elective office; and

WHEREAS, the Board desires to establish the total annual compensation for these elected officials, which is separate and distinct from the fringe benefits offered by the

County to elected officials, and which fringe benefits are subject to increase or decrease during the officer's term at the discretion of the Board and in accordance with state and federal law; and

WHEREAS, as part of the County's fringe benefit program, county elected officials may participate in the Wisconsin Retirement System in accordance with state law; and

WHEREAS, as part of the County's fringe benefit program, county elected officials may elect to receive health insurance coverage under the same terms and conditions as the health insurance coverage offered to other Jackson County employees.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Jackson County Board of Supervisors, that the total annual compensation for county elected officers under Wis. Stat. § 59.22(1) shall be as follows, effective on the first day of a term of office that begins after the date of this Resolution:
